As a Secondary Lay Teacher in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, you and your family members have access to an *Employee Assistance Program and WorkLife Services* through **OPTUM.** These services are available 24/7, either by phone or on-line, and are strictly confidential. There is no cost for using this benefit. You will need to logon to liveandworkwell.com to register, using access code Archphilly.

You can speak with master's level employee assistance specialists who provide consultation, risk screening, advocacy, referrals and educational materials. Or you can use their web services, which are available in both English and Spanish. There, you can search self-help information, resource databases/directories, video programs, personal empowerment programs and find thousands of articles online at **liveandworkwell.com**.

- Financial coaching from experts (up to 60 minutes free consultation)

How can one capsulize a 54-year friendship in six or seven paragraphs? So much gets left out due to life being what it is for both of us. However, here goes.

I met Vince in 1970. I was fresh out of college, and my first teaching assignment was West Catholic High School for Boys. I had no idea what was in store for me. I walked into the English Dept. and met (what didn't take me long to realize) the most marvelous, wonderfully eccentric and creative group of teachers I had ever been around.

Back then there was no such thing as having a lead teacher. My chair, Mike Sikorski, gave Vince to me to watch over me and teach me the ropes. Vince was, I believe, just back from two years in the Peace Corps. *That really impressed me*. It said to me, what a loving and caring man he was. We clicked immediately. He loved teaching, and I soaked in all I could and all he had to offer. Vince was truly a Master Teacher.

We found that we both shared the love of teaching, the theatre, good movies--both new and oldand good food. Years later, he got me to eat alligator. I am still not sure it tastes like chicken. We found we had many more things in common, and over the years our friendship grew stronger.

Life took a cruel twist for Vince and his family in 1985 when his wife, Marylynne, passed away from breast cancer. I was married then, to Belinda, a teacher at West as well, and during the days prior and after Marylynne's passing, we tried to assist his family deal with the loss. Vince, though, was the rock that put the pieces back together again.

Life took another cruel turn when in 1998 my wife passed away from cancer. Vince was there during and after Belinda's passing. He was at her bedside with me and the family when the end came. I have never or will ever forget his love for my wife and my daughter, Ashley. It was now his turn to help us weather the storm and put the pieces back together again. We both were now raising children as single parents. Vince had it mastered and helped me in so many ways.



For 54 years, my admiration and respect for Vince never waned. He was a marvelous father, a wonderfully kind and generous human being, and one of the finest teachers I have ever known or worked with. I was blessed to have known him and to have shared in part of his journey.

IN MEMORIAM

John Francis Cramutolo September 26, 1951 to December 13, 2024

Father Judge High School mourns the loss of Mr. John Cramutolo, a deeply respected teacher who dedicated over 50 years to guiding students within the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. As a

beloved English teacher, Mr. Cramutolo leaves a powerful legacy of exceptional teaching, an unwavering commitment to Catholic education, and a profound impact on the Father Judge community.

Affectionately known to many as "John Cram" or simply "Cram," he was admired for his kind spirit, witty humor, and the unwavering support he offered students during challenging times. Throughout his distinguished career, he also served as Assistant Principal at North Catholic and Lansdale Catholic High Schools and successfully led the AOP Summer School program, ensuring students were well-prepared to return to their respective schools. Mr. Cramutolo deeply believed in offering individuals second chances. A humble and spiritual man, he often quietly assisted others, allowing their accomplishments to speak for themselves.

John played many pivotal roles at Father Judge during his long and distinguished career. He transcended the role of a mere English teacher, serving as a mentor, guide, and esteemed figure within the school community for many of his fellow educators. He held the positions of department chair and head of the English Language Arts curriculum. As the Stage Crew supervisor, he enthusiastically shared his passion for theater and the arts, encouraging students to explore their talents beyond the confines of their regular coursework. He also served as the school's union representative, demonstrating unwavering dedication and professionalism.

John shared his commitment to continuous professional development, expressing his desire to refine his teaching methods. This might involve integrating new educational technologies, exploring improved online resources, or utilizing student writing to effectively model the writing process. He believed that educators should engage in learning and share effective teaching strategies with their colleagues.

Mr. Cramutolo's teaching style was renowned for its high standards and challenging expectations. He consistently pushed his students to think critically, articulate their ideas with clarity and persuasiveness, and develop a profound understanding of literary texts. His English classes were both stimulating and in-depth, preparing students for the rigors of college and fostering a lifelong appreciation for literature and the art of effective writing.

Former students often recall Mr. Cramutolo's demanding nature alongside his genuine care for their success. One former student reminisced, "Mr. Cramutolo pushed me harder than any other teacher I've ever encountered, but he also believed in my potential more than anyone else." Another student shared, "He was both demanding and fair, strict yet compassionate; he was truly an exceptional teacher. In a school brimming with influential figures, he stood out as a giant." A former student and colleague remarked, "Few teachers have had the profound impact that Mr. Cramutolo had on me and my peers. He was truly transformative." This sentiment is echoed by numerous Father Judge graduates who attribute their subsequent success to the strong foundation they received in Mr. Cramutolo's classroom.

As we bid farewell to Mr. John Cramutolo, we celebrate a life dedicated to teaching, mentoring, and nurturing young minds. His enduring legacy lives on through the thousands of students he taught, the colleagues he inspired, and the profound impact he had on Father Judge High School. He truly fostered the holistic development of his students – spiritually, intellectually, and socially – and his influence will continue to shape the school for generations to come.

May his memory be a source of comfort and inspiration to all who knew him, taught alongside him, or had the privilege of being his student. Father Judge High School and the broader Archdiocesan community have lost a true leader in education, but his profound influence will forever remain with those whose lives he touched. Rest in peace, Mr. John Cramutolo.
